Tom Gramatikas and Tim Montoya, Bill Miller and Sean Miller and Wayne Parker and Ray Bersano all tied for third with 273.

Dwayne and Josh Sherwood played out of the Vic Lowendowski flight. The teams of Mark Captain and Race Munroe and Richard Williams and Ralph Starlin tied for second at 271.

In the Les Gobleck flight, Ken Brown and Tom Heffner took first with 285, Don Kaplan and Jim Doss and Dallas Reuter and Dean Wilfong tied for second at 286.

In the women's Bonnie Stoeckel flight Kay Anderson and Sonny Williams took first with a 301 followed by Margie Pais and Janet Wietersen with 304s.

Nuggets even series

Kobe great, but
the Lakers never
really had a shot

DENVER — He can't do everything.

But if the Lakers are going to advance to the NBA finals, Kobe Bryant might just have to.

Over four desperate minutes late in Monday night's 120-101 loss to Denver, Bryant took the first shot on all seven Los Angeles possessions, made it to the line six times and scored 13 points in a futile attempt to catch up.

The rest of the Lakers' production: four free throws from Pau Gasol.

So, Los Angeles left Denver having regained home-court advantage, but appearing never more dependent on its admittedly exhausted star with the series now tied at 2.

"Yes, those are actions we have to go to and they're drastic actions," Lakers coach Phil Jackson said of the Kobe-or-nothing strategy at the end.

Bryant was attached to an IV in the locker room after Game 3, when he hit a 3-pointer and five free throws late to help the Lakers take a late lead and keep it.

He finished with 34 points in this game and is still averaging 36 for the series. But there was no late run in this game, the first of the series to be decided before the last few possessions.

Bryant conceded he was exhausted after almost single-handedly pulling one out for the Lakers in Game 3 — sort of the same way he did it in Game 1. Jackson said he didn't have any problem with his superstar admitting a weakness.

"It's foolish to deny it. He could barely stand up," Jackson said in the pregame.

Bosley's performance brings TRP crowd to its feet

TUCSON — Coming off of back to back wins, Sierra Vista's David Bosley did not have high hopes for the Pro 4's main event Saturday at the New Tucson Raceway Park.

With the return of father-son duo Jim and Chris Bates who had dominated the division when they last raced more than three years ago, "The Boz" knew he would have his work cut out for him in the feature race.

Bosley got to work early moving into third on the first lap from his sixth-place starting position. Jim Bates took the early lead, and the younger of the Bates began making his way through the nine-car field.

By lap three, Bosley was in second with Chris Bates gaining and Jim Bates opening the gap in first. On the seventh lap, Chris Bates took second and started closing the gap on his dad.

With the Bates battling for the lead, lap by lap Bosley closed the gap, reaching the duo with one to

go for what looked to be a nose-to-tail finish. The Sierra Vista driver saw an opening and the three-pack finished within inches of each other with Jim Bates in

third, Bosley second and Chris Bates in third.

Jeff Spencer represented Sierra Vista in the Super Late division in twin feature races. Still fighting the setup on his No. 00 car, Spencer spun on the first lap but recovered before the caution came out.

Matthew Williams took the lead on the seventh lap. With five to go in the 25-lap feature, Spencer began working on Dave Larson for fourth but was unable to make the pass. He finished fifth. Williams held onto the lead.

In the second of the Super mains, Spencer would lead from the pole position. Contact between Matt Levin and Spencer left some rubber on Spencer's right front fender and caused him to fall to fourth.

Williams again had taken the lead. At the midway point, a cau-
